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## **Ongoing NESP Activities**

Collecting Ecosystem Success Stories

Tara O'Shea, a master's student at Duke University's <u>Nicholas School of the Environment</u>, and Lydia Olander of the <u>Nicholas Institute for Environmental Policy Solutions</u> are collecting case study information involving governments, businesses, or other entities in the United States changing their actions or policies in order to protect or enhance the ecosystem services that benefit them.

We have posted several examples on our <u>website</u>, as well as added them to the <u>Conservation Registry</u>. This will just the beginning of an effort to catalogue ecosystem services projects and programs in the United States. Landowner Surveys on Ecosystem Services

Lilly Zoller, another master's student at the Nicholas School, helped compile a list of studies that surveyed landowners about ecosystem services. The <u>surveys</u> covered

topics that included not only their willingness to participate in payments for ecosystem service programs and to pay to protect ecosystem services, but also their opinions of existing programs.

Lydia Olander is on the steering group helping with the development of a new web portal being developed by the Institute of Natural Resources at Oregon State University with funding from the USDA, EPA, and USGS.
